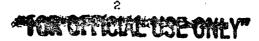

- 1. During the last quarter the greatest emphasis, both in Maintenance and Engineering, was the plant set-up for both the Mustard Demil and the Demil of the M34 Clusters. Contract in the M34 Demil area was awarded to W. B. Industries for the modifications to Bldg 1606. Work will begin this week by the contractors; they have until the last of November to complete their portion of the work. The decision was made during this period that the GB will be chemically neutralized. The major remaining problem to be resolved is whether a new sealed industrial waste basin is to be built. There are two projects at higher authority for approval, one for the construction of an 80-acre basin, the other for the construction of a 10-acre basin.
- 2. In the Mustard Demil area, a great deal of work was accomplished during the quarter. This plant is to be completed during the month of September. The furnace instillation will begin in August and should be completed in September. The major problem to be resolved in the Mustard Demil Program is the handling of the residue left in the H containers after unloading. The decision was made that the by-product salt from the incinerator will be stored in the three-sided werehouses until disposition is made of the material.
- 3. Funds were received for the installation of a chain link fence at the Toxic Yard. The fence has been received and installation will begin this week.
- 4. One of the PENA projects for the decentamination and disposal of excess GB manufacturing and filling equipment was received. The PEMA



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project for the removal of buried material in Section 36 was returned. It is hoped that this will be resubmitted this quarter.

- 5. During the last quarter the Air Force Finance and Accounting Center moved into Bldgs 341 and 342. A request has been received from the Air Force Pinance and Accounting office for permission to move into Bldg 362. This request is being forwarded to higher authority for approval.
- 6. Work continued as fill-in projects on the removal and decontamination of equipment from the mustard manufacturing plant, the clean-up of the mustard demilitarization equipment and the removal of the equipment of the M74 Incendiary Line.
- 7. During the next quarter the major workload will again be the plant set-up of the Hustard Demilitarization and the H34 Demilitarization Plants.
- 8. The Engineering Office is at the present time two under authorized strength, and the Maintenance Division is four under strength.

- 1. THERE HAS BEEN A DECIDED DROP IN THE WORK LOAD AT THE ROCKY MOUNTAIN ARSENAL DURING THE PAST FISCAL YEAR, AND THE PERSONNEL IN THIS DIRECTORATE HAVE BEEN DECREASED TO LESS THAN FIFTY PER CENT OF THE NUMBER ASSIGNED AT THE START OF THE FISCAL YEAR.
- 2. THERE HAVE BEEN THREE PROJECTS IN WHICH THE ARSENAL HAS BEEN INVOLVED, DURING THE PAST FISCAL YEAR, IN SUPPORT OF THE SOUTHEAST ASIA ACTIVITIES: THESE INCLUDED THE WHITE PHOSPHOROUS FILLED 105MM SHELL AND M34 GRENADE, FOR THE ARMY, AND THE RENOVATION OF THE CNU/80 MISSILE SHIPPING CONTAINER FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF THE AIR FORCE.
- 3. OTHER ACTIVITIES, IN WHICH THE INDUSTRIAL OPERATIONS DIRECTORATE MAS INVOLVED DURING THE FISCAL YEAR, INCLUDED THE NAVY'S HETEYE BOMB.

 THE HONEST JOHN WARHEAD AND THE REDISTILLATION OF GB AGENT. ALL THREE OF THESE PROGRAMS WERE COMPLETED, OR SUSPENDED, PRIOR TO THE START OF THE FOURTH QUARTER.
- 4. OPERATIONS CONTINUED THROUGH THE YEAR IN HYDRAZINE MISSILE FUEL BLENDING, MUNITIONS DEMILITARIZATION, TON CONTAINER DECONTAMINATION, CLOTHING IMPREGNATION AND SPECIAL PROJECTS ACTIVITIES.
- 5. THE FOLLOWING IS A BRIEF SUMMARY OF THE PROJECTS THAT HAVE BEEN COMPLETED DURING THE PAST FISCAL YEAR:

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M34, WHITE PHOSPHOROUS FILLED, GRENADE PROGRAM

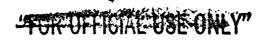
APPROXIMATELY 400,000 M34 GRENADES WERE FILLED WITH WHITE PHOSPHOROUS, AND THE PROGRAM WAS COMPLETED DURING THE SECOND QUARTER, FISCAL YEAR 1970.

b. WETEYE BOMB PROGRAM

THE NAVY WETEYE BOMB PRODUCTION WAS COMPLETED DURING THE SECOND QUAR-TER, AND THE MUNITIONS ARE NOW IN STORAGE AT ROCKY MOUNTAIN ARSENAL. IF THE BAN ON MOVING THESE TOXIC FILLED MUNITIONS IS REMOVED, THEY WILL BE TRANSFERRED TO SOME OTHER DEPOT FOR STORAGE.

- HONEST JOHN WARHEAD PROGRAM
- (1) THE PRODUCTION OF THE HONEST JOHN WARHEAD WAS SUSPENDED, DURING THE SECOND QUARTER, AND THE COMPLETED ITEMS ARE STORED AT ROCKY MOUNTAIN ARSENAL IN AM IGLOO.
- (2) PRODUCTION OF THE H139 BONBLETS WAS CONTINUED FOR A FEW WEEKS. BUT THE OPERATION OF THIS FILLING LINE WAS, ALSO, SUSPENDED. THESE FILLED BOMBLETS ARE STORED IN BARRELS IN WHICH SELF-SEALING INSPECTION PORTS HAVE BEEN INSTALLED. THESE BARRELS OF BOMBLETS ARE, ALSO, IN STORAGE IN THE TOXIC YARD AT ROCKY HOUNTAIN ARSENAL.
 - REDISTILLATION PROGRAM

(1) A TOTAL OF 500 TONS OF AGENT WAS REDISTILLED. FOR USE IN ARMY AND MAYY MUNITIONS, WITH A RECOVERY OF 376 TONS OR A 72.1 PER CENT YIELD.



Program Review and Analysis - July 1970 THE REDISTILLATION WAS COMPLETED DURING MARCH 1970, AND THE FACILITY PLACED INTO A STAND-BY CONDITION. THE AGENT NOT UTILIZED IN FILLING MUNITIONS IS PRESENTLY STORED IN UNDERGROUND TANKS IN BUILDING 1506.

- (2) A CONTRACT HAS BEEN ISSUED FOR THE REHOVATION OF TOM CYLINDERS TO MEET ICC SHIPPING SPECIFICATION. IT IS PLANNED TO TRANSFER THE DISTILLED AGENT INTO THESE TON CONTAINERS FOR LATER SHIPMENT TO OTHER STORAGE DEPOTS. THE BRASS PLUGS AND VALVES ON THESE CYLINDERS WILL BE REPLACED WITH STEEL FITTINGS IN ORDER TO REDUCE THE ABSORPTION OF HEAVY METAL COPPER ION FROM THE PLUGS AND VALVES.
- 6. THE FOURTH QUARTER, FISCAL YEAR 1970, OPERATIONS ARE DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS:
 - a. 105MM, WHITE PHOSPHOROUS FILLED, SHELL PROGRAM
- (1) A TOTAL OF 469,232 105MM SHELLS WERE FILLED WITH WHITE PHOSPH-OROUS TO COMPLETE THIS PROGRAM DURING APRIL 1970. ALL SHELLS, WHICH WERE AVAILABLE AT ROCKY MOUNTAIN ARSENAL FROM THE 105MM MUSTARD SHELL DEMILITARIZATION PROGRAM, WERE FILLED AND SHIPPED.
- (2) THE LINE OPERATED EXCEEDINGLY WELL DURING THE FINAL MONTHS OF OPERATION WITH ONLY A FEW PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED, SUCH AS PLUSGED WHITE PHOSPHOROUS LINES AND AN OCCASIONAL LOSS OF CONTROL ON THE HEIGHT-OF-FILL.
- (3) THE FILLING MACHINE. PAINT AREA AND STORAGE FACILITY WERE CLEAN-ED UP WHEN THE PROGRAM WAS COMPLETED. THE WHITE PHOSPHOROUS REMAINING

IN THE PLANT SYSTEM WAS TRANSFERRED TO ONE UNDERGROUND TANK FOR STORAGE. AND ALL OTHER STORAGE TANKS WILL BE DRAIRED. ONE CAR OF WHITE PHOSPHOROUS. WHICH HAD NOT BEEN UNLOADED, WAS SUBSEQUENTLY SHIPPED TO PINE BLUFF ARSE-NAL. ALL REJECT SHELLS WERE DRAINED AND THE CASINGS BURNED AND SENT TO

SALVAGE AS SCRAP STEEL. PERSONREL FROM THIS PRODUCTION AREA HERE TRANS-FERRED TO THE CHU-80/E AIR FORCE REHOVATING LINES OR OTHER FACILITIES.

b. CNU-80/E AIR FORCE SHIPPING CONTAINER PROGRAM

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- (1) THE PROJECT RECEIVED FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF THE AIR FORCE; FOR REMOVATING THE CHU-80/E MISSILE SHIPPING CONTAINER, HAS BEEN THE PRODUCT DIVISION'S MAJOR WORK LOAD DURING THE FOURTH QUARTER. THE FACILITY PREVIOUSLY UTILIZED FOR THE SHRIKE AND SPARROW CONTAINER REMOVATION PROGRAMS IS BEING USED FOR THIS PROJECT.
- (2) PRODUCTION WAS STARTED DURING THE THIRD QUARTER, AND AS HAY BE NOTED, A TOTAL OF 7,839 CONTAINERS WAS COMPLETED DURING THE FOURTH QUARTER MAKING A TOTAL OF 8,388 CONTAINERS COMPLETED TO DATE.
- (3) THIS ORDER WAS RECEIVED IN A PIECEMEAL MANNER, THAT IS, IN THREE SEPARATE INCREMENTS. THE FIRST QUANTITY WAS FOR ONLY 1,002 CONTAINERS. THIS WAS LATER INCREASED TO 7,898 AND, RECENTLY, WAS INCREASED TO 15,296. THE AIR FORCE FUNDED THESE ORDERS ON THE BASIS OF \$58 PER CONTAINER AND REQUESTED A RENOVATION RATE OF 180 CONTAIN-ERS PER DAY.

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- (4) AT THE TIME THE FIRST PROCUREMENT/WORK DIRECTIVE WAS RECEIVED.

 IT WAS POINTED OUT TO HIGHER HEADQUARTERS, AND TO THE AIR FORCE, THAT

 MEITHER THE COST PER ITEM NOR THE DELIVERY SCHEDULE COULD BE MET BY

 ROCKY MOUNTAIN ARSENAL. NO FUNDS WERE ALLOTTED BY THE AIR FORCE FOR

 ANY PLANT SET UP. THIS MADE IT INPOSSIBLE TO INSTALL AN EFFECTIVE

 SANDBLASTING FACILITY OR A MEANS FOR HANDLING THE ITEMS IN AN EFFECTIVE, MASS PRODUCTION-TYPE, MANNER.
- (5) AT THIS TIME, ROCKY MOUNTAIN ARSENAL IS, ALSO, EXPERIENCING A HIGH OVERHEAD COST. THIS IS DUE TO THE LOW WORK LOAD AND THE FACT THAT ANY PRODUCTION ORDER MUST HELP FINANCE THE ENTIRE ARSENAL OVER-HEAD INCLUDING COSTS FOR MAINTENANCE OF THE POST, SECURITY AND FIRE PROTECTION.
- (6) THE CONTAINERS ARE RECEIVED FROM OVERSEAS, AND THE REMOVATION INCLUDES THE FOLLOWING OPERATION:
- (a) REMOVING DENTS EXCEEDING ONE-HALF INCH DEPTH OVER A TEN (10) SQUARE INCH AREA.
- (b) REPAIR, BY WELDING, ANY HOLES WHICH HAVE BEEN KNOCKED INTO THE CONTAINER DURING SHIPMENT.
 - (c) CLEANING, BOTH INSIDE AND OUTSIDE, OF THE CONTAINER BY STEAM.
 - (d) BUFF, OR SANDBLASTING, OF ALL RUSTED AREAS.

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- (e) APPLICATION OF A PRIME COAT ON ALL BARE METAL FOLLOWED BY PAINTING OF THE ENTIRE CONTAINER.
- (f) REPLACEMENT OF SKIDS, HANDLES OR GROUND WIRES THAT HAVE HAD EXCESSIVE DAMAGE.
 - (g) RESTENCILLING THE CONTAINER AS SPECIFIED.
- (7) A STANDARD, WHICH INCLUDES PRODUCTION, MAINTENANCE AND QUALITY ASSURANCE DIRECT LABOR, WAS ESTABLISHED BY THE MANAGEMENT SERVICES DIVI-SION AT 3.6 HOURS PER CONTAINER. DURING THE PAST MONTH, THE AVERAGE TIME AMOUNTED TO 2.93 HOURS PER CONTAINER FOR PRODUCTION DIRECT LABOR AND .6 HOURS FOR DIRECT SUPPORT LABOR, THUS, TOTALLING SLIGHTLY UNDER THE STANDARD.
- (8) YERY FEW PROBLEMS HAVE BEEN ENCOUNTERED IN THIS PROGRAM, AND SOME OF THESE ARE DISCUSSED AS FOLLOWS:
- (a) THE MAIN PROBLEM WAS THE LACK OF SPARE OR REPLACEMENT PARTS. THIS WAS PARTIALLY DUE TO THE LACK OF INFORMATION. AT THE START, CON-CERNING THE USAGE FACTORS AND, PARTIALLY, DUE TO THE RECEIPT OF THE ORDERS ON A PIECEMEAL BASIS. SUFFICIENT TIME HAS NOT BEEN AVAILABLE FOR PROCURE-MENT OF PARTS. THE ORIGINAL INFORMATION INDICATED A REPLACEMENT FACTOR OF 25 PER CENT ON ALL CUSHIONING PARTS. SO FAR. THE PROGRAM HAS REQUIRED A REPLACEMENT FACTOR OF BETTER THAN 70 PER CENT ON SEVERAL OF THE CUSHION-ING PARTS. THERE ARE TWO DIFFERENT TYPES OF CONTAINERS, ONE OF WHICH REQUIRES 100 PER CENT REPLACEMENT OF PARTS, THUS, BRINGING THE OVERALL USAGE FACTOR UP TO THE 70 PER CENT LEVEL.



- (b) AS STATED PREVIOUSLY, FUNDING WAS NOT AVAILABLE FOR INSTALLING AN EFFECTIVE SANDBLASTING FACILITY; THEREFORE, ANY CONTAINER WITH EXCESSIVE RUST CREATED A PROBLEM AND REQUIRED CLEANING WITH AN ELECTRIC BUFFER. THIS REQUIRED TIME OVER AND ABOVE THE STANDARD SET FOR THE FULL OPERATION.
- (c) SEVERAL OF THE CONTAINERS STILL CONTAINED LIVE MUNITIONS. THESE ITEMS MUST BE REMOVED FROM THE BUILDING, TECHNICAL ESCORT DETACHMENT MUST BE MOTIFIED AND DISPOSITION INSTRUCTIONS REQUESTED FROM HILL AIR FORCE BASE.
- (d) DUE TO THE "REDUCTION-IN-FORCE" UNDER WAY, THERE HAS BEEN A HIGH INCIDENCE OF LEAVE USAGE BY THE EMPLOYEES CAUSING SHORT CREWS AND MAKING IT DIFFICULT TO NEET THE DAILY, SCHEDULED PRODUCTION RATES.
- (9) INFORMATION WAS RECEIVED THAT THE TOTAL PRODUCTION WILL BE DE-CREASED BY APPROXIMATELY 2,000 CONTAINERS FOR RENOVATION. THIS DECREASE IS DUE TO THE COST PER UNIT; AMOUNTING TO APPROXIMATELY \$80.00 PER CON-TAINER AS COMPARED WITH THE \$58.00 MADE AVAILABLE BY THE AIR FORCE. THE PRESENT PRODUCTION RATE AND THE LOWERED PRODUCTION QUANTITY WILL EFFECT AN EARLY COMPLETION, AND THIS DATE IS EXPECTED TO BE PRIOR TO THE END OF AUGUST 1970.

C. TON CYLINDER DECONTAMINATION

CHART 4

(1) ALL OF THE TON CYLINDERS EMPTIED DURING THE GB REDISTILLATION PROGRAM HAVE BEEN DECONTAMINATED BY BURNING. TON CYLINDERS CONSIDERED EMPTY, AND THE PREVIOUS CONTENTS UNKNOWN, WERE ALSO PASSED THROUGH THE FURNACE FOR DECONTAMINATION.



- (2) THIS PROGRAM WAS COMPLETED ON 16 APRIL 1970, AND THE CHART SHOWS THE NUMBER OF TON CONTAINERS THAT WERE BURNED AND DECONTAMINATED TO DATE.
 - ANTIPERSONNEL MINE PROGRAM
- (1) AUTHORITY WAS RECEIVED TO DESTROY THE 3.5 MILLION XM40 AHTI-PERSONNEL MINES BY BURNING. A CYLINDRICAL, ROTARY, HEAVY-WALLED KILN WAS RECEIVED FROM THE TOOELE ARMY DEPOT AND INSTALLED IN THE FIELD AT ROCKY MOUNTAIN ARSENAL. TEST OPERATIONS WERE STARTED EARLY IN MARCH TO DETERMINE THE BEST METHOD OF DESTROYING THE MINES.
- (2) THE MAJOR PROBLEM WAS CORVEYING THE MINES INTO THE FURNACE WITHOUT CLOGGING UP THE MOUTH OF THE FURNACE. A BUILDUP OF MIKES, IN THIS AREA OF THE FURNACE, CAUSES AN EXCESSIVE DETONATION WHICH BLOWS UNBURNED NINES OUTSIDE THE FURNACE, THUS, CREATING A HAZARD. THE PRO-CEDURE FINALLY USED, WHICH PROVED SUCCESSFUL, WAS THE ADDITION OF TWO GALLONS OF DIESEL OIL TO EACH BARREL OF 6,000 MINES CONTAINED UNDER FREON. THE OIL CAUSED THE MINES TO IGNITE FASTER AND ELIMINATED THE EXCESSIVE BLASTS.
- (3) THERE IS A TOTAL OF 550 BARRELS OF MINES TO BE DESTROYED IN THIS PROGRAM; AND AT THE CLOSE OF THE QUARTER, A TOTAL OF 388 BARRELS OF MINES HAD BEEN BURNED. IT IS EXPECTED THAT THIS PROGRAM WILL BE COMPLETED DURING THE MONTH OF JULY 1970. ROCKY MOUNTAIN ARSENAL HAS NOT RECEIVED ANY DISPOSITION INSTRUCTIONS ON THE 4,990 CDU/10 CANISTERS

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Program Review and Analysis - July 1970 LOADED WITH THE XM40 MINES. THESE CANISTERS ARE PRESENTLY LOADED INTO 499 KITS AND MUST BE CONTINUALLY MONITORED TO ASSURE THAT THE FREON LEVEL IN EACH CANISTER IS ADEQUATE.

d. MINOR DEMILITARIZATION OPERATIONS

DEMILITARIZATION OF THE 4,000 H125 BOMBLETS, TO FURNISH TEST SAMPLES FOR THE DESIGN ENGINEERS AT THE TOOELE ARMY DEPOT, WAS STARTED DURING THE NONTH OF MAY. THIS OPERATION HAS ACCOMPLISHED BY OPERATORS IN FULL PROTECTIVE SUITS, AND THE WORK WAS COMPLETED DURING JUNE. THE BOMBLET CASINGS WERE DECONTAMINATED BY BAKING IN ELECTRIC GYENS.

(2) E139 BOMBLETS

THE E139 BOMBLETS FOR THE LANCE PROGRAM, WHICH HAD BEEN HELD IN A SURVEILLANCE PROGRAM, WERE DEMILITARIZED BY DRILLING, DRAINING AND BAKING THE CASINGS IN THE ELECTRIC OVENS. THERE ARE STILL SOME E139 BOMBLETS UNDER SURVEILLANCE BY THE QUALITY ASSURANCE OFFICE.

- (3) DECONTAMINATION OF AGENT VX
- (a) APPROXIMATELY 1,800 POUNDS OF AGENT VX, CONTAINED IN TON CYLINDERS AND IN MUNITIONS, WERE DETOXIFIED AND THE CONTAINERS DECONTAMINATED DURING THE MONTHS OF MAY AND JUNE. THE MUNITIONS INCLUDED: FIFTEEN (15) LAND MINES, TWO (2) EIGHT-INCH SHELLS AND A 155MM SHELL. THERE WERE THREE (3) PARTIALLY FILLED TON CYLINDERS AND THREE (3) EMPTY CONTAINERS THAT HAD PREVIOUSLY CONTAINED VX.



(b) THE CHEMICAL WAS DRAWN FROM THE MUNITIONS AND THE CYLINDERS INTO A DECONTAMINATION TANK INTO WHICH WATER WAS PREVIOUSLY INTRODUCED, AND THE MIXTURE CHLORINATED UNTIL NO MORE CHLORINE WAS TAKEN UP. THE RESULT-ING SOLUTION WAS NEUTRALIZED WITH 18 PER CENT CAUSTIC PRIOR TO DISCHARGING INTO THE CHEMICAL WASTE SYSTEM. THE EMPTY MUNITION CASINGS AND TON CY-LINDERS WERE SOAKED IN CHLORINATED WATER AND THEN DECONTAMINATED IN THE TON CONTAINER DECONTAMINATION FURNACE.

CLOTHING TREATMENT PLANT

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- (1) IMPREGNATION ORDERS FOR THE ARMY AND HAVY WERE COMPLETED PRIOR TO THE PAST QUARTER, AND THE EQUIPMENT WAS CLEANED UP AND PLACED IN STAND-BY. DURING APRIL AND MAY, THE CHLY OPERATION IN THE LAUNDRY CON-SISTED OF THE PROCESSING OF CLOTHING FOR THE LOCAL OPERATIONS, AND NO PROBLEMS HERE ENCOUNTERED.
- (2) ON 15 JUNE, A SMALL ORDER FOR IMPREGNATION OF CLOTHING FOR THE ARRY WAS RECEIVED, HOWEVER, THIS ORDER WAS SMALL EMOUGH TO BE HANDLED BY THE MORNAL LAUNDRY CREW. THE ORDER WAS COMPLETED IN JUNE, AND THE CLOTH-ING SHOULD BE PACKED AND SHIPPED EARLY IN JULY 1970.

f. HYDRAZINE MISSILE FUEL PROGRAM

CHART 5

(1) AS MAY BE NOTED, ONLY 262,460 POUNDS OF HYDRAZINE WERE BLENDED TO PRODUCE AEROZENE-FIFTY FUEL DURING JUNE AND THE QUARTER, WITH A TOTAL OF APPROXIMATELY 900,000 POUNDS DURING THE ENTIRE FISCAL YEAR.

Program Review and Analysis - July 1970 NO PROBLEMS WERE ENCOUNTERED, AND ALL SHIPMENTS WERE MADE ON SCHEDULE TO THE DEPARTMENT OF THE AIR FORCE.

(2) A TOTAL OF 16,575 POUNDS OF "JPX" FUEL WAS PRODUCED BY BLENDING UNSYMETRICAL DIMETHYL HYDRAZINE WITH JP4 MATERIAL. THIS FUEL WAS PLACED IN DRUMS AND SHIPPED, MAKING A TOTAL OF 26,000 POUNDS THAT HAS BEEN BLEND-ED AND SHIPPED DURING THE PAST FISCAL YEAR.

g. MUSTARD TRANSFER TESTS

- (1) IN ORDER TO OBTAIN DATA FOR THE TASK FORCE EAGLE MUSTARD DEMILI-TARIZATION PROGRAM, SEVERAL TON CYLINDERS OF LEVINSTEIN MUSTARD AND TWO (2) TON CYLINDERS OF DISTILLED MUSTARD WERE BROUGHT INTO THE PLANT TO DETERMINE: HOM NUCH OF THE AGENT CAN BE PULLED OUT OF THE CYLINDERS BY YACUUM, AND HOM MUCH RESIDUE WOULD REMAIN AND REQUIRE BURNING?
- (2) THE ORIGINAL CRITERIA FOR THE AMOUNT OF RESIDUE WAS NOT TO BURN ANY TON CYLINDERS IN THE FURNACE UNLESS THE RESIDUE REMAINING AMOUNTED TO NO MORE THAN FIFTY (50) YOUNDS. OF THE FIRST FIVE (6) TON CYLINDERS OF MUSTARD RUN. TWO (2) HAD PLUGGED EDUCTOR TUBES AND ONE (1) HAD A DEFEC-TIVE VALVE.
- (3) IT WAS FOUND POSSIBLE TO TRANSFER APPROXIMATELY 1,350 POUNUS, FROM EACH OF THE OTHER TWO (2) CYLINDERS, OUT OF THE 1,800 POUNDS AVAIL-ABLE IN EACH CYLINDER. A RESIDUE OF APPROXIMATELY 450 POUNDS WAS LEFT IN EACH CONTAINER. TWO (2) TON CYLINDERS, CONTAINING DISTILLED MUSTARD,



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WERE TRIED NEXT. THE CONTENTS FLOWED WITHOUT MUCH PROBLEM, AND THE
CYLINDERS WERE EMPTY IN APPROXIMATELY FIFTEEN (15) MINUTES EACH.

- (4) ONE CONTAINER, WITH APPROXIMATELY 550 POUNDS OF RESIDUE, WAS BURNED FOR FIVE (5) HOURS EFFECTING A WEIGHT LOSS OF 380 POUNDS WITH APPROXIMATELY 170 POUNDS ASH REMAINING.
- (5) SEVERAL TON CYLINDERS WERE THEN BROUGHT INTO THE THAN ROOM, AND THE TEMPERATURE CONTROL SET AT 130° FAHRENHEIT. TWELVE (12) OF THESE CYLINDERS WERE TRANSFERRED WITH AN AVERAGE OF 176 POUNDS OF RESIDUE REMAINING. THE TEMPERATURE IN THE THAN ROOM WAS INCREASED TO 170° FAHRENHEIT, AND FIVE (5) CYLINDERS WERE TRANSFERRED WHEN THE TEMPERATURE IN THE CYLINDERS REACHED 145° FAHRENHEIT. THE AVERAGE RESIDUE REMAINING AMOUNTED TO LESS THAN 100 POUNDS. THESE CYLINDERS WERE BURNED; AND TO OBTAIN COMPLETE ASH, THE TIME REQUIRED RANGED FROM FORTY-FIVE (45) MINUTES TO THREE (3) HOURS AND AVERAGED ONE (1) HOUR AND TWENTY-FOUR (24) MINUTES.

h. PHOSGENE TRANSFER PROGRAM

(1) EIGHT (8) TON CYLINDERS, CONTAINING PHOSGENE AND STORED IN THE TOXIC YARD, WERE DISCOVERED TO BE LEAKING. THE PHOSGENE WAS TRANSFERRED FROM THESE CYLINDERS INTO CONTAINERS WITH GOOD VALVES. THIS OPERATION WAS ACCOMPLISHED IN BUILDING 1501.

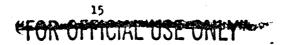
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- (2) TWO PROBLEMS WERE ENCOUNTERED DURING THESE TRANSFERS WHICH MUST BE CORRECTED PRIOR TO ANY FURTHER TRANSFER OR DETOXIFICATION OF PHOSGENE IN BUILDING 1501:
- (a) FIRST, THE MIO MASKS, AVAILABLE TO ROCKY MOUNTAIN ARSENAL, HAVE DETERIORATED; AND ALSO, THERE IS A SHORTAGE OF CANISTERS AVAILABLE FOR USE AS REPLACEMENTS. THE SCOTT AIR PACKS WERE ALSO TRIED, BUT ONLY ONE (1) OUT OF THREE (3) FUNCTIONED PROPERLY.
- (b) THE SECOND PROBLEM INVOLVED THE LACK OF EFFICIENCY OF THE BUILD-ING 1503 SCRUBBERS TO REMOVE ALL TRACES OF THE PHOSGENE WHICH WAS BEING VENTED DURING THE TRANSFER. THESE SCRUBBERS ARE DUE FOR REHABILITATION IN THE TASK FORCE EAGLE DEMILITARIZATION PROGRAM, AND IT IS NOT PLANNED TO USE THEM UNTIL THIS WORK HAS BEEN ACCOMPLISHED.

1. SPECIAL PROJECTS PROGRAM

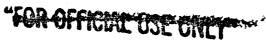
- (1) THERE HAVE BEEN NO OPERATIONS IN THE SPECIAL PROJECTS AREA OTHER THAN LAND CONDITIONING AND THE CLEANING AND REPAIRING OF EQUIPMENT. FINAL DISPOSITION INSTRUCTIONS HAVE NOT BEEN RECEIVED ON THE MATERIAL AT THE VARIOUS SITES. THE DECISION ON THE DISPOSITION WILL BE DEPENDENT UPON THE ANALYSIS OF THE MATERIAL LOCATED AT THE VARIOUS SITES.
- (2) EQUIPMENT IS BEING MOVED FROM THE AREA AT SITE NUMBER 3 TO SITE NUMBER 1 IN ORDER TO DISCONTINUE THE MAKNING AT SITE NUMBER 3 AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.



- (3) A SMALL. MULTIHEARTH FURNACE WAS RENTED IN ORDER TO RUN EXPERI-MENTS ON BURNING MATERIAL AND TO ESTABLISH THE NECESSARY DATA TO ENABLE THE PROPER DESIGN OF EQUIPMENT FOR ACCOMPLISHING THE WORK REQUIRED. DUR-ING THE FINAL TWENTY-FOUR (24) HOUR TEST RUN, THE ROTARY GRATES MELTED. AND THE FURNACE HAD TO BE DISASSEMBLED. HOWEVER, SUFFICIENT INFORMATION WAS GENERATED DURING THESE EXPERIMENTAL RUNS.
- 7. OPERATIONS PLANNED FOR THE FIRST QUARTER, FISCAL YEAR 1971, INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING:
- a. COMPLETION OF THE CNU-80/E SHIPPING CONTAINER RENOVATION DURING AUGUST.
 - b. BLENDING OF AEROZENE-FIFTY MISSILE FUEL.
- C. DESTRUCTION OF XM40 ANTIPERSONNEL MINES (TO BE COMPLETED DURING JULY 1970).
- d. OPERATION OF THE CLOTHING TREATMENT PLANT AND IMPREGNATION OF CLOTHING FOR THE ARMY AND NAVY.
 - e. MINOR DEMILITARIZATION AS REQUIRED.
- T. EXPERIMENTAL WORK WITH MUSTARD-FILLED CONTAINERS FOR TASK FORCE EAGLE.
- 8. FOLLOWING IS THE MANPOWER POSITION FOR THE DIRECTORATE OF INDUSTRIAL **OPERATIONS:**

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- a. PERSONNEL WITHIN THE PRODUCT DIVISION DROPPED FROM A STRENGTH OF 206, AT THE START OF THE FISCAL YEAR, TO 110 AT THE END OF THE THIRD QUARTER. A FINAL "REDUCTION-IN-FORCE" IN JUNE REDUCED THE PERSONNEL TO THE SCHEDULED AUTHORIZED STRENGTH OF 80 PERSONNEL AS THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED.
- b. A PROBLEM WITH THE LACK OF WORK LOAD IS ANTICIPATED IN AUGUST WHEN THE CNU-80/E RENOVATION PROGRAM IS COMPLETED, UNLESS THE IMPREGNATION ORDERS FOR THE CLOTHING TREATMENT PLANT ARE RECEIVED SOON ENOUGH TO ALLOW THE PROCUREMENT OF THE NECESSARY CHEMICALS FOR THE PROCESS.
- C. IT IS ANTICIPATED THAT THE MUSTARD DEMILITARIZATION FACILITY WILL BE FAR ENOUGH TOWARDS COMPLETION BY SEPTEMBER TO ALLOW THE INITIATION OF A TRAINING PROGRAM FOR THE PERSONNEL IN THE OPERATION OF THE EQUIPMENT. TO MINIMIZE SPACES WITHIN THE DIRECTORATE, THE PERSONNEL IN THE PRODUCTION CONTROL DIVISION WERE REDUCED TO A SINGLE PERSON, AND THE FUNCTION WAS TRANSFERRED TO THE PRODUCT DIVISION. ALSO, DUE TO THE LACK OF PRODUCTION LINE OPERATIONS, THE ENTIRE QUALITY CONTROL DIVISION WAS ELIMINATED.
- 9. IN SUMMARY, IT IS FELT THAT, UNDER THE ADVERSE CONDITIONS CAUSED BY A "REDUCTION-IN-FORCE," THE DECREASING WORK LOAD, AND THE PROBLEMS IN PROCURING ADEQUATE PARTS FOR THE CNU-80/E RENOVATION PROGRAM ON A TIMELY BASIS, THE OPERATIONS IN THE DIRECTORATE HAVE BEEN OF A HIGHLY SATISFACTORY NATURE DURING THE PAST QUARTER.

Director of Logistical Services - Mr. T. H. McElroy (T. Leverett presenting)

1. Supply Division

- a. Activity in the Supply Division during the 4th Quarter was not too rushing. However, we did receive 3484 line items; issued 4679 line items, and shipped 270 line items for a total of 8133 tons handled. The phosgene was rewarehoused and is now all contained within the toxic storage yard. Shipments of the CNU containers continued as fast as they were finished. We evidently swamped the contractor, however, and now are holding to shipments of 750 per week.
- b. During the Quarter our excessing program continued but was limited to the dollars the comptroller determined we could stand as a loss. This is confined to the indirect materials. Direct materials which were already charged to a program were excessed with no regard to the dullar value because it did not effect our profit and loss statement. Disposition was made of quite a number of Special Projects items after we received the proper clearances from Hill Air Force Base.

2. Procurement Division

During the 4th Quarter FY 70, a total of 15 formal contracts were awarded. These contracts were awarded either through formal advertising or formal negotiation. Monetarily, they amounted to a total of \$662,541. Total procurement dollars obligated during this Quarter was \$800,673. This represents a total of 898 procurement actions processed for 1,869 line items.

3. Disposal Division

- a. As depicted on the chart, generation of excess property during the 4th Quarter amounted to \$2,997,117 which is the value of the 6,216 line items received. Of this figure, \$1,746,353 was amountion such as 10599 bodies, M55 components, etc. Transfers, donations and sales were at about the average for a quarter except that the figure of \$6,910,509 expended to scrap was higher than usual. This was the result of downgrading the remainder of a Mace Missile training site. There was a large dollar value connected with this but there was no commercial or sales value on the items.
- b. During the quarter we retailed approximately 2,700 items for \$3,124. We sold 1414 tons of scrap metal for \$60,398.
- c. It is anticipated that the 1st Quarter of FY 71 generation will be quite a bit lower than the 4th Quarter of FY 70 figure.

4. Transportation Division

- a. Motor operations The volume of work orders dropped slightly during the 4th Quarter of FY 70 even though we had an increase in mileage. We will realize a further decrease in the near future because we received 20 new Ford pickup trucks with automatic transmissions.
- b. In the area of rail operations our number of switches for the 4th Quarter was 600 as compared to 808 in the 3rd Quarter. These switches - are primarily for tenant activities.
- c. Commercial transportation activities remained about the same as in the 3rd Quarter.

- 1. During this quarter the Quality Assurance Office performed acceptance inspection in the following areas:
 - a. M60, 105 WP Projectiles
 - b. Hydrazine Blending
 - c. CNU/80 Container Refurbishing
- 2. The quality of the M60, WP projectiles for the total program is shown in the viewgraph.

- 3. Depot surveillance has been completed on all stocks, during which, two (2) Honest John warheads were found to have contamination between the warhead and the barrier bag. No contamination has been found outside the barrier bag or in the storage igloo. Survaillance is being conducted 100% each month, and daily checks of the igloo are being conducted by depot personnel, using rabbits. Verbal instructions from Edgewood Arsenal have been given to leave the two contaminated warheads in the igloo. A request for waiver will be processed by the Director of Logistical Services support, which will authorize the storage of the two unserviceable warheads with the serviceable ones.
- 4. The air monitoring network is in full operation for mustard decomposition products and work is progressing on the alarm system. Preliminary tests of the transmission lines and signal treatment electronics will be performed as soon as the telephone cables have been installed from Station \$6 to the laboratory. This is scheduled for July 1970.
- 5. As a result of the reduction-in-force, two problem areas have been experienced:
- a. The carloading inspector's position was abolished in the Quality Assurance Office, and the function has been transferred to the Safety Office.

b. Funds and personnel have not been provided for water and sewage analysis. Although air pollution monitoring has been well covered, there have been no provisions made for water pollution monitoring. The Quality Assurance Laboratory is attempting to provide some limited support in this area, but it is considered that Project Eagle should provide funds and personnel spaces to accomplish this work, because it is the demil projects that will be generating liquid wastes as well as those into the air.

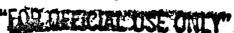
Safety Office - Mr. Henry R. James

- 1. A comparison of the fourth quarter safety record with that of the third indicates that a favorable trend exists.
- 2. This improvement in our accident experience is evident when compared to RMA "GEMS" target. Annex C to Edgewood Arsenal Five Year Base Program has a target of a 15% reduction in accidents, injuries and costs in the previous three year average. RMA has met these requirements.
- 3. RMA accident experience has also exceeded AMC target requirements for FY 70. (Show chart #3).
- safety training was accomplished during the fourth 4. Scheduled quarter. Say 2004 47.
- 5. The following plans for the fourth quarter FY 70 have been accomplished:
 - a. Safety inspection requirements.
 - b. Safety training requirements.
 - c. On-the-job training for Safety Office staff.
- d. MA Regulation 385-15, Standing Operating Procedures, has been published.

1. Personnel Utilization:

- a. The current authorized strength of the installation is 115 military and 452 civilians. Five of the 452 authorized civilian spaces are temporary positions authorized for the first phase of the Special Project demilitarization.
- b. The actual strength as of 30 June 1970 was 87 military and 462 civilians. However, 11 of the civilians were on leave pending disability retirement early in FY 1971. The actual military strength was made up of 16 officers, 1 warrant officer and 70 enlisted. The most pressing problems in the area of military personnel continues to be the shortage of military policemen. Of the 25 authorized spaces for the 522d Hilitary Platoon only 13 enlisted were on board as of 30 June 1970. The average strength of the military police platoon for FY 1970 has been 16. Increased effort should be made by Edgewood Arsenal to hold this unit at its authorized strength in order to assure the security required for the current Arsenal operations.
- c. A reduction in force was conducted during the fourth quarter. This reduction was necessitated by the withdrawal of the 105 MP Shell Filling Program.
- d. The current authorization of 447 civilians will be adequate to meet planned workload schedules for the first half of FY 1971. However, if both the H34 demilitarization and the Mustard demilitarization programs are operated concurrently during the third quarter, approximately 50 additional personnel will have to be hired. There is also a requirement, presently unfunded, to impregnate 244,000 one-man sets of clothing. The current authorized



strength does not provide personnel for this operation. Rocky Mountain Arsenal recommends that the Mustard demilitarization program be completed before the M34 demilitarization is commenced. This would allow for adequate experienced personnel for the demilitarization program and also provide personnel for the clothing impregnation order.

e. The expressed policy of Munitions Command and Edgewood Arsenal has been that Rocky Mountain Arsenal would be allowed to fill all vacancies within the authorized strength of 447 and also authorized adequate temporary spaces to meet scheduled requirements. If this policy is changed to freeze hiring, a serious problem of lack of adequate skills will occur which could cause slippage in the demilitarization schedules.

2. Cost Reduction Program:

During the Fourth Quarter FY, Cost Reductions amounting to over \$200,000. were submitted to Edgewood Arsenal for validation. These submissions bring the total cost reductions for Fiscal Year 1970 to \$234,400., or 81% of the established goal of \$289,000. This achievement of cost reductions in spite of a significant reduction in workload and workforce, and during a period of continued changes in the Arsenal's programs, is considered to be an excellent effort on the part of Arsenal managers to control costs. The goal of \$289,000. established at the beginning of the fiscal year was based upon a programmed sales budget of approximately \$18,000,000. whereas this program was reduced by higher headquarters to \$10,000,000.

3. Lessons Learned Program:

One Lessons Learned was submitted during this quarter.

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4. Work Measurement Program:

With the reduction of the workforce directed by higher headquarters, this program has been curtailed to give primary emphasis to establishing standards for direct labor and for maintenance work orders. This policy will continue for FY 1971.

5. Direct Labor Effectiveness:

Direct labor effectiveness for the fourth quarter, as well as the entire fiscal year, has continued to above 90% effectiveness. During May and June increased effectiveness has been realized on the CNU 80 program due to methods changes and the receipt of sufficient parts to assure completion without re-handling.

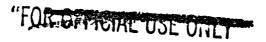
6. Non-productive Labor:

3,079 hours of non-productive labor was recorded during the quarter. The non-productive labor was kept at a minimum by efficiently reassigning personnel to current projects. However, the lack of sufficient orders necessitated the 3,079 hours until the reduction in force actions were completed. The hours reported were from Quality Control and Product Division where personnel could n ot be reassigned to current operations.

7. Project "GEMS":

Slippage occurred in two areas - Cost Reduction and Project DIMES (Work Neasurement). The cost reduction goals of number of cost reductions and dollar value were not met, (the Arsenal attained 81.1% of goal) because the goals were established based upon a considerably higher planned level

of operation. The Work Measurement goals of 100% coverage of all indirect labor by standards, either engineered, work sampling, or statistical, cannot be met with the current authorized strength of one work measurement analyst. Rocky Mountain Arsenal can continue to provide direct labor standards for all productive and maintenance

work.

Comptroller - Mr. V. T. Butoff

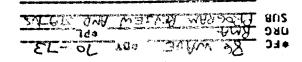
- 1. Operating Gain or Loss Rocky Mountain Arsenal showed a very good financial position as of 30 June 1970. The operating gain was \$2,799, compared with a gain last year of \$2,709.
- 2. Overtime Custs A total of \$5,590 was returned for the 4th Quarter-\$9,000 for the entire Fiscal Year--a little better than 10% of the amount authorized by Edgewood Arsenal.
- 3. TDY Travel Rocky Mountain Arsenal did better in terms of utilizing travel authorization. Last year was the first attempt at budgeting travel and we utilized only 50% of the amount allocated.
- 4. Projected Sales There are four big areas: CNU 80 Repair, Clothing Impregnation (Marines and Army), Task Force Eagle and Disposal Operations.
- 5. Project GEMS The overall comparison on GEMS for the Fiscal Year is as follows:

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6. Savings Bonds - By 30 June 1970, Rocky Mountain Arsenal had 90% participation. As a result, we are getting a gold star on the flag which is an award for five consecutive years of over 90% participation.

Program Review and Analysis - July 1970

Civilian Personnel Office - Mr. Kenneth E. Hickman

1. The following indicates program accomplishments in the Civilian Personnel Program for the fourth quarter, FY 1970:

a. Management Actions:

(1) Strength: Strength continued to decline from 591 at the end of the third quarter to 476 at the end of this quarter. A breakdown of personnel actions completed since 6 March 1970, date of general RIF notice, through 30 June 1970 is as follows:

(2) Position and Pay Management:

- (a) One hundred percent review of positions was accomplished by the end of the fiscal year.
- (b) Of the 268 positions reviewed by supervisors this quarter 18.7 percent were audited by the Civilian Personnel Office. Because of the low percentage of review for the first three quarters, due to the Position Classification Specialist vacancy, only 12.8 percent were audited this Fiscal Year.
- (3) Disciplinary Actions: One disciplinary action was recorded during the reporting period. An employee of the Security Office was suspended for three (3) days for being absent without leave (ANOL).
- (4) Awards: A total of 17 formal awards were presented to deserving employees during the quarter. Although no objective is established for total awards, this figure represents 3.0% of the average number of employees



receiving awards for the fourth quarter. The Department of the Army average for the fourth quarter of last fiscal year was 4.1%. A breakdown of awards is indicated below:

Total monetary awards granted for the Fiscal Year total 19 SSP Awards to Wage Grade employees for a rate of 6.6% of the average WG strength and 38 SSP and QSI awards to Class Act employees representing 12.6% of the average Class Act strength for the Fiscal Year. Some improvement in the imbalance of monetary awards between Class Act and Wage Grade employees was noted during the fourth quarter when 5 WG SSP awards for a rate of 2.4% and 4 Class Act monetary awards for a rate of 1.67 based on end of quarter strength were approved. Eight of the 17 formal awards approved during the quarter were Certificates of Achievement.

b. Employee Reactions:

- (1) Sick Leave: As expected, sick leave usage continued to be high during the quarter because of the major RIP which was effected during this period. Usage increased from 21.2 hours per employee for the third quarter to 24.6 hours for the fourth quarter. This exceeds the DA goal of 15.5 hours by 9.1 hours. The recent legislation permitting credit of unused sick leave in computing retirement annuities was again publicized during the quarter but appears to have had little effect since many of the employees affected by the RIF were not eligible for retirement and could see no advantage in conserving their sick leave. It is hoped that, since the current RIF has been completed, that sick leave usage will decline during the next quarter.
- (2) Voluntary losses: Seventeen (17) voluntary losses occurred during the quarter for a rate of 29.8 per 1000 employees. DA objective for the fourth quarter is 17.2 per 1000. This is a direct result of the major RIF effected during the quarter. These employees resigned for other employment which offered better long-range job security.

The Department of the Army submission goal for military and civilian suggestions was again exceeded. This is considered especially noteworthy because of the disruptive effect and adverse impact on employee morale experienced

during the quarter as a result of the major reduction in force. Almost half of the total workforce was affected in some way when approximately 227 RIF notices were issued on 20 April. The annual submission goal of 275 per 1000 employees was exceeded with a performance of 349 per 1000 for military suggestion submissions and 290 per 1000 for civilian suggestion submissions.

No Department of the Army objective has been established for tangible savings. The goal reflected above is a local one based upon the adoption goal. The quarterly civilian suggestion adoption goal was met on target. The military adoption goal was not met. The Civilian suggestion adoption performance of 88 per 1000 substantially exceeded the DA annual goal of 70 per 1000. The annual military rate was 60 per 1000. Total annual benefits per \$1.00 awarded amounted to \$23.22, a substantial increase over the previous quarter's \$9.21.

- (c) Suggestions on Hand: The majority of suggestions continue to be processed within the 20 work-day time frame as evidenced by the fact that 12.2% civilian suggestions and 6.9% military suggestions remain on hand at the close of the quarter against a DA objective of 20%.
- (4) Grievances and Appeals: Three appeals were filed during the quarter as a result of the reduction in force. Two appeals are pending at the Denver Region, U. S. Civil Service Commission, and one is being processed through Department of the Army channels. One appeal filed last November in which this installation was upheld at intermediate command level is now pending at DA.

Program Review and Analysis - July 1970

Equal Employment Opportunity - Mr. Fred P. Goeritz

- 1. Utilization of minority groups decreased during this quarter. With the decrease of the workforce by 116 employees, from 578 last quarter to 462 this quarter, the utilization of minority groups decreased from 29.4% to 27.5%. The percentage of Negros in the workforce decreased from 9.2% to 8.7%. This figure may be compared with the 4% of Negros in the Denver Metropolitan Area, which is the recruiting area for the Arsenal.
- 2. There are a total of 69 women employed on the Arsenal or 14.9% of the workforce. This does not include the women employed by the Dispensary. The Arsenal has 73 handicapped people presently employed.
- 3. During this past quarter, the Commanding Officer, Civilian Personnel Officer, Federal Momen's Coordinator, and the Equal Employment Opportunity Officer, attended a Department of the Army regional seminar on equal employment opportunity. The four EEO Counselors attended a three day Counselor's Training Course conducted by the Denver US Civil Service Commission.
- 4. The Civilian Personnel Officer, Federal Women's Coordinator, EEO Counselors and EEO Officer have been drafting the Equal Employment Opportunity Plan of Action for FY 1971. It is planned to have it published during the coming quarter.

Post Surgeon's Office - Dr. Maurice D. Gaon

- 1. Project "GEMS". No Project "GEMS" slippages.
- 2. Project "LEACHE" (Long ferm Effects Anticholinesterase Agents). Additional equipment has been received and is on hand, however, delivery of the new EEG's has been deferred to early September 1970. EEG performance has been discontinued pending completion of new cages and return of authorization of expenditures by Edgewood Arsenal. Money already available was terminated due to the end of the fiscal year, and return of funds already made available is expected momentarily.

- 4. One EEG Technician (Trainee) hired 28 Jun 70 is currently on loaned labor to another Department. One Technician is currently at Edgewood Arsenal for advance training.
- 5. Support continues to be furnished to nearby Ft Carson in conducting Blood CRE's for personnel assigned to operation "EZD HAT".
- 6. The RIF just completed, caused an increased number of partial examinations along with added laboratory tests.
- 7. Statistics of injuries are presented in attached charts. Workload of smergency medical care has been markedly reduced.

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Fourth Quarter Program Review and Analysis - July 1970 Adjutant's Office - 2LT John D. Reynolds (CWO P. Goslee presenting)

1. Military Family Housing:

- Occupancy rates were 100% for both adequate and inadequate housing.
- b. A Self-inlp program was initiated to help allay the costs of maintaining the buildings and to allow more funds for equipment and major maintenance items. The hoped-for expansion in the number of units had to be postponed again because of fund shortages.

2. Mall and records:

- remained reductions forced a therp curtailment in well discribution, and delivery continues to be spasmodic. An entire reorganization of the Adjutants Office, which included the abolition of the Mail and Records and Military Personnel Divisions and the combination of all elements into one administrative unit under the Adjutant, should free enough people to permit the resumption of regular mail service before the end of July.
- b. Class fied like: were decentralized to allow more efficient employment of available personnel. 5 linear feet of classified files were disposed of in the process. This action will permit more time to be devoted to military publications, records management and mail distribution.

3. Military Personnel:

- a. During the quarter enlisted strength increased from 53 as of 31 March to 57 as of 30 June, 1970 for the HQ Company with an authorized strength of 70. The Military Police Platoon which is authorized 24 enlisted personnel decreased from 21 as of 31 March to 13 as of 30 June, 1970. There were no significant changes in the attached personnel for the Escort and Disposal Detachment, the US Army Dispensary and for meteorological support.
- b. Officer strength during the quarter, increased from 14 to 16 officers assigned. Five losses and no known gains are contemplated for the lat Qtr. FY 71.

4. Special mixings:

All opecial Services activities have experienced increased participation during the quarter. Revenues from the swimming pool have exceeded the expected \$2600, and are still coming in. Grants from the Army Central Welfare Fund of \$2500, for salaries and \$600, for maintenance assure solvency through the rest of the season and readiness for the next.

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Program Review and Analysis - July 1970

Security Office - 1LT Terry A. Mc Cann

- 1. RMA experienced one administrative security violation during FY70, it occurred during the second quarter. We had no security violations in FY69. During FY71 increasing emphasis will be placed upon reducing the number of classified files on hand thereby reducing the exposure to security violation situations. We hope to get back on the Zero Defects track in this area.
- 2. With the removal of the bulk phosgene from open fields and placing it within the toxic storage, we no longer require any waivers to the security standards prescribed by AR 190-3. We do still have three valid exceptions to that regulation, however,
- a. The continued storage of Category II bulk agent in the existing refrigerated one-story brick building (Bldg 741) in lieu of the igloos prescribed in the regulation.
- b. The continued storage of Category II munitions (M-34 clusters) in transitory weather protection shelters within the barbed wire enclosed restricted area in lieu of the prescribed igloos.
- c. The continued storage of bulk agent within the existing barbed wire fence in lieu of an FE-6 fence. During the first quarter FY71 this fence will be brought up to FE-6 specifications.
- d. All of the above have been combined under one exception, PSE-AUSRM-1-69.
- 3. During FY70 security guard strength varied considerably. We started the year with 32 authorized civilian guards and the 522d MP Platoon (Service) which has remained understrength all year. Its present strength is down to 12 enlisted men. Last July approximately 35 military policemen from Ft. Bragg, North Carolina were on temporary duty here. They were replaced by a like number of Tech Escort personnel from Edgewood Arsenal until 11 November. In December our civilian guard authorized strength was increased to 71 and by the end of January we had these people trained and on the job. The 30 June reduction in force reduced the figure to 62. The last two months of the year saw a steady decline in strength because of resignations. In other words, the second half of PY70 was marked by considerable turmoil in the guard force and much time spent in intensive training, some of the men gained in December and January were lost in the June RIF. We are currently training Il replacements assigned on 28 June. A twelfth man assigned has since resigned. As of the end of the year, the overall strength picture was as follows:

4. During the quarter, 27 security clearances for access to classified information were granted bringing the year's total to 164, compared with 255 during FY69. The decreasing arsenal strength is well reflected in the decline of security clearances granted. No security clearances were suspended or revoked. Fifteen Dossiers were reviewed bringing the year's total to 148, considerably more than the 77 in FY69. A high proportion of the enlisted personnel assigned to the arsenal are reviewed for possible assignment to Special Projects, but the number accepted has declined. Twenty-six SMI inspections were conducted during and after duty hours. One hundred twenty-five of these inspections were conducted during the year; this compares favorably with the 135 conducted during FY69. Eighteen security briefings were conducted during the quarter, 143 persons were debriefed, and 95 individuals were tested on safeguarding classified information.

- 5. Provost Marshal activities during the quarter resulted in 46 apprehensions, 206 for the year, compared with 127 in FY69. With the reduced population on the arsenal and a larger security force, it is obvious that security guards and military police have been more active. Twenty-six people were brought before the US Commissioner in the last quarter, 23 were convicted. Of the 96 brought before the Commissioner during the year, 82 were convicted. Two hundred seventy-nine privately-owned vehicles were registered during the quarter. Only 1530 were registered during the year, compared to 3335 in FY69. At the end of the year 2102 privately-owned vehicles were registered with the Security Office to be operated on the arsenal, compared to 2864 a year ago. There has been a rather steady decline since the high point of 3873 at the end of the second quarter, FY68.
- 6. RMA continues to be a popular place to visit; 24,400 came through the gates during the fourth quarter, bringing the year's total to 67,822 compared with the 60,258 in FY69.

- 7. Two hundred forty-one security badges were issued during the quarter, 575 during the year. Four hundred eighteen identification pictures were taken bringing the year's total to 3147 compared to 3808 in FY69. One hundred four fingerprint cards were prepared during the quarter, 460 were prepared during the year.
- 8. Government property in the amount of \$98.00 was reported lost or stolen during the quarter, and \$141.00 worth of private property was reported lost or stolen. No Government or private property was recovered. FY70 has had our poorest recovery rate of any year recorded. This has been due in part to the considerable time lag between discovery of loss and reporting the loss.

Program Review and Analysis - July 1970

Headquarters Commandant - Captain Peter D. Kaunitz

- 1. The following activities were accomplished by Headquarters Company and the 522nd Military Police Platoon during the Fourth Quarter, FY 70.
- a. Troop billets have been improved with the addition of new bunks.
- b. The Arsenal Color Guard represented the Arsenal in Aurora's Gateway to the Rockies Parade and led Commerce City's Memorial Day Parade.
- c. The unit supply system has been reorganized with an eye towards supply economy and a better identification of costs.
- d. The 522nd Military Police Platoon has formed a pistol team.
- 2. Planned objectives for First Quarter, FY 71 are as follows:
- a. The 522nd Military Police Platoon's pistol team will participate in the Provost Marshal General's Trophy Pistol Team Match in September.
- b. Both the Company and the Platoon will begin a new FY training cycle.

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Program Review and Analysis - July 1970

Post Judge Advocate - Captain Michael C. Abrahm, Jr.

- 1. During the Fourth Quarter of FY 1970, this office conducted the following activities.
 - a. Military Justice.
- (1) The Post Judge Advocate was defense counsel for two enlisted men tried by Special Court-Martial at Pitzsimons General Hospital.
- (2) The Post Judge Advocate was counsel for three enlisted men who were respondents in AR 635-212 board proceedings at Pitzsimons General Hospital.
 - (3) One Article 15 punishment was imposed.
- b. Claims. Two claims filed under the Military Personnel and Civilian Employees' Claims Act were processed and paid.
- c. Military Affairs. One report of survey was completed. Two other reports of survey were received and are now pending.
- d. Training. The office completed all training for military personnel scheduled for FY 1970. The office conducted a class for civilian guards; the class covered the subjects of arrest and apprehension, search and seizure, carrying firearms, and the use of force.
- e. Legal Assistance. The office disposed of 98 legal assistance cases.
- 2. The office plans the following activities for the next quarter.
- a. The office will apprise the Provost Marshal of all recent Supreme Court cases which affect law enforcement activities.
- b. In addition to the regularly scheduled lecture on Personal Commercial Affairs, the office will initiate a program of consumer education. The office will distribute written materials on such subjects as the new Federal Wage Garnishment statute, Truth in Lending, and automobile sales.

Post Inspector - Captain Peter D. Kaunitz

- 1. All planned objectives for the Office of the Post Inspector for the Fourth Quarter were completed. In conjunction with the Annual General Inspection, USAMC Security Support Agency performed an Annual Physical Security Inspection and a Counterintelligence Inspection was conducted by Region IV, 113th Military Intelligence Group.
- 2. Plarmed objectives for First Quarter, FY 1971 include conducting scheduled and non-scheduled inspections as required.

Program Review and Analysis - July 1970

Public Information Office - Mr. Paul E. McDonnell

1. Information Activities:

- a. In mid-April, during the ill-fated Apollo 13 flight, a voluntary release was made to all local newspapers and television/radio stations concerning the blending of the fuel for the spacecraft at Rocky Mountain Arsenal. All TV stations requested permission to film the hydrazine plant and, on a pool arrangement, one station responsed to the filming. Efforts to arrange for a personal appearance at RMA of Denver astronaut, Jack Swigert, failed.
- b. Numbers of the news media were invited to attend the presentation of the HYPA's Grand Award for Fire Prevention by BG Erwin M. Graham, Jr., CG, MICOM. Three TV stations responded and turned out good film coverage.
- c. Community newspaper coverage was given to the presentation of the Suggestion Program Excellence plaque to Mrs. Connie Martin, Program Coordinator, by U. S. Representative Donald G. Brotzman during the Armed Forces Day reception at the Officers! Club.
- d. A minor controversy arcse when an AP wire story implied that Colorado Health Department representatives were "turned away at the gate" when they attempted to get water samples. A felay in higher headquarters in obtaining approval for this coordination triggered this story. A cleared statement was given to the news nedia callers.
- e. Other voluntary news released included employee awards, LTC Shear receiving the Army award pleque for Suggestion Program Excellence from COL Cerar, and COL Cerar's final visit to RMA.
